The Collar by George Herbert "The Collar" by George Herbert is a thirty-six line poem about a speaker 's struggle for freedom. It was written by Herbert in 1633 while he struggled with his own religious beliefs. The poem does not conform to one particular rhyme scheme but jumps from half or slant rhymes to full end rhymes.

Analysis of The Collar by George Herbert

The title can be taken as a collar of restraint (although priests in Herbert's day did not wear the white collar so familiar in our day), an expression of choler (anger), or the cry of a caller.
